### American Housing Survey


2011: Features of the home

# Sample 2019 American Housing Survey Questions

Without assistance from another person, does anyone in the household 6 years of age and older currently have difficulty entering the home or property because of a condition other than a temporary injury?


Without assistance from another person, does anyone in the household 6 years of age and older currently have difficulty using a bedroom because of a condition other than a temporary injury? Consider such activities as reaching and opening closets or windows, getting dressed, or getting in or out of bed.

### Person-Environment Fit

- Speaks to the alignment between a residents' needs and the home
- Adequacy of fit can affect behavior and health
  - Poor fit may limit individuals' functioning and mean they need to rely on others for help, change behaviors in their home, or face heightened risks
  - A good fit can increase residential stability, safety, independence
- Environmental gerontology emphasizes person-environment fit; "draws upon the idea that old age is a period of adult development profoundly influenced and shaped by the environment" (Wahl)
  - Person-environment fit is not static but changes as environments change (e.g. home deteriorates), individuals' circumstances change (e.g. health changes)

### **Number of Households with a Member Experiencing Difficulty (Millions)**




Note: Difficulties entering, navigating, and using the home without assistance are the result of a condition other than a temporary injury and apply to occupants over 6 years old.


**Share of Households Reporting Difficulty (Percent)** 






# Households Headed by Someone 50-69 Report Over Half of Difficulties Entering/Navigating Home

Any Difficulty Entering/Navigating Home, Number of Households




Any Difficulty Entering/Navigating Home, Share of Households (Percent)






## Disabilities that May Affect House Fit Increase with Age

### **Share of Households Reporting Difficulty (Percent)**





### **Share of Households Reporting Specific Feature in Their Home (Percent)**



### **Share of Households reporting Feature (Percent)**



# Older, Lower-Income Households Are Most Likely to Have Difficulties Getting Around In or Using Their Homes


#### **Share of Households with Any Difficulty (Percent)**







Share of Households Reporting at Least One Difficulty (Mobility, Bathing/Dressing, Seeing, Hearing, Doing Errands) (Percent)





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# Older People of Color Are More Likely to Report Difficulties with Their Home


Share of Households Reporting a Difficulty Entering, Navigating, or Using Home (Percent)





## Disabilities Diverge Only Slightly by Race/Ethnicity


### **Share of Households Reporting a Member with at Least One Disability (Percent)**





# At Oldest Ages, Households In Which a Member Uses a Mobility Device Are Most Likely to Report Their Homes Fit Their Needs Very Well







## Improving Housing for the Future

- Single-family homes: "Visitable" homes offer zero-step entry, doors that are 32" wide or more, and accessible entry-level bathroom
- Multifamily buildings: Fair Housing Act requirements; Americans with Disabilities Act (public and common areas); Section 504 (HUD programs)

## Improving Housing Fit

- Programs to assess barriers and modifications
- Assistance to residents to make modifications
  - Medicaid Home and Community-Based Care Waivers
  - VA, USDA Rural Development programs
  - State and local programs for households with older adults and/or persons with disabilities
    - Massachusetts Home Modification Loan Program
    - Bath Housing Comfortably Home
  - Nonprofit programs Habitat for Humanity, CAPABLE
- Renters and accessibility








# Over the Next 20 Years, Households in Their 80s Will Be the Fastest Growing Age Group
